ATLANTA (January 27, 2022) — The Coalition of Refugee Service Agencies is proud to share the release of House Bill 932, which would extend in-state tuition at Georgia public colleges and universities to refugees immediately upon their arrival to our state. This bill also applies to individuals who risked their lives to support the U.S. military overseas, including our Afghan allies who had to be evacuated last summer after the fall of Afghanistan to the Taliban.

H.B. 932 is born from the hard work of the House Global Talent Study Committee, a long-time project of the CRSA. We thank Rep. Wes Cantrell for his leadership on the important issue of tuition access for all Georgians seeking to build a better life and give back to their communities. We look forward to seeing H.B. 932 become law.
